1- "A" Mountain

2- **Apache Trail** (Road)

The Trail has been "permanently" closed since a 2019 flood ruined the roadway. Before heading that way, check this website.

East of Phoenix – gorgeous scenery! Will take 4 hours or so... more if you stop for a burger and soda at Tortilla Flats. Go to Apache Junction and get on the "Apache Trail". At the end, turn right at Roosevelt dam and go back to Phoenix on the highway around the Superstition Mountains. It's all "Scenic Highway" back to Phoenix.

3- Arivaca, Arizona

18- Longhorn Grill

19- Mount Lemmon

Northeast of Tucson. Paved, smooth road to the top. Great scenery and a nice Café at the top. Lance Armstrong used the mountain road as a training ground!!! Unbelievable!!!

20- Meteor Crater

East of Flagstaff on highway 40 is the best-preserved Meteor Impact Crater on Earth. It is about a mile across and 800 feet deep, was created about 50,000 years ago. It is an impressive sight!

21- Madera Canyon

22- Old Tucson

This is where many of the Hollywood Western movies were made!! You might even remember seeing some of the buildings and mountain backdrops in a favorite Western. There are activities, gunfights, a Saloon, a train ride around the perimeter, a wagon ride, and museum. (Old Tucson has Closed!)

24- Diamondback Bridge

As you go into Tucson from I-10 onto Broadway Street, there is a pedestrian bridge which they have modified to resemble a rattlesnake. It is a mile or so east of the Interstate. Really a cute landmark!

25- Petrified Forest

East of Meteor Crater as you near the New Mexico border, is Petrified Forest National Park. It takes a couple of hours to drive through, but longer if you stop at the scenic turnoff's and get a closer look. Some areas are spectacular. Don't miss the "Blue Mesa Road" turn off.

26- Prescott, Arizona

28- Sabino Canyon

Northeast of Tucson is gorgeous Sabino Canyon. We never went there until 2011... our bad!!! It is absolutely spectacular!!! A not to miss attraction if you are in the area. Bring your camera. It is a National Park, and a fee is collected to enter. They do honor the National Parks Pass if you have one. Bring cash for the tram ride to the top, they do not accept plastic. No food or drink is available on site, so bring a lunch and water with you. Wear walking (hiking) shoes.

29- Sedona, Arizona

Sedona has much to keep you occupied. Drive up to the top of the Mesa to the airport and have a lunch at the restaurant up there. The "Chapel of the Rocks" is in town and a real photo opportunity. Try to find "Snoopy Rock" It can be seen from downtown. Cathedral Rock Park is a nice spot to take a walk. It's an easy trail back into an area where you get a great look at the Cathedral Rock formation. This is "Red Rock" country and it is gorgeous.

30- Sunset Crater

33- Tubac, Arizona

34- Tucson Cathedral on Stone Street
